KEEPING OUR SCHOOL SAFE AFTER HOURS: A MESSAGE ABOUT UNWANTED INTRUDERS

This is an important reminder regarding the safety and security of our school grounds outside the regular school hours of 8.35am to 3.25pm. Recently, there have been a number of incidents involving unauthorised individuals entering school property after hours often around the hours of 4.30 to Midnight. While these individuals may not always have harmful intentions, their presence still poses a risk to school security and community trust.

We would like to make it clear that our school grounds are not open to the public after hours, unless it is for an approved school event or community activity.

We have experienced:

- Property damage and vandalism
- Littering and misuse of school facilities

This has incurred costs for repairs and cleanup. To help keep our school safe and in good condition for everyone, we ask all families and community members to:

- Report any suspicious activity on or around school grounds after hours to the Police on 000 or 131 444
- Remind students that they should not be on school property after hours without supervision or prior permission. Support our efforts by respecting the locked gates.

We have engaged with the Police for more police presence in the area. Our school is a shared space we all value for authorised persons. Let's work together to keep it safe, clean, and welcoming for our school families.

The Student Led Conference portal on COMPASS is now open for bookings. Conferences are scheduled for Wednesday June 24th, starting at 11.00am and concluding at 6.45pm.

To make a booking - From the COMPASS home screen on your app, select the menu (bottom right) and click Conferences.

- This will be a PUPIL FREE DAY - STUDENTS ONLY ATTEND SCHOOL WITH THEIR PARENTS FOR THEIR CONFERENCE TIME.
- Student Led Conferences are a 13-minute meeting where your child talks to you about their learning this semester.
- Students have chosen pieces of work to show and discuss.

If you have any difficulties making a booking, please contact your child's home group teacher.

We will be providing student achievement reports for Semester One this year as usual. Reports will be released on COMPASS on Friday 19th of June.

The reports will continue to provide important details about the Victorian Curriculum essential learning, student effort and behaviour and the progression point allocated for achievement. Assessments are conducted regularly throughout the semester to support the teacher judgement for the progression point.

Full descriptive comments are not included in the report as the AEU had included a 'ban on all aspects of work related to the provision of written comments on student reports that will be provided to parents' in the industrial action. This is also why we have not released any progressive reporting this term.

However, parents and carers will be pleased to know that at the Student Led Conferences on the 24th of June you will be able to see the student workbooks with all of your child's learning evidence and the teacher can highlight their achievement through the regular assessments collected throughout the semester that has informed the progression point. In addition, parents can request a meeting with teachers to discuss your child's progress at any time throughout the year.

SMALL GROUP LEARNING

This week, our Year Six small group learning students have been making fantastic progress in their reading development! Alongside building their fluency, students have been focusing on the important skill of making inferences by using clues from the text combined with their own background knowledge to deepen their understanding of what they read.

This is a key comprehension strategy that helps students become more thoughtful, independent readers, allowing them to "read between the lines" and engage more meaningfully with a range of texts. We are proud of the effort and enthusiasm students are bringing to these sessions.

Year 3 – 6: Students are to read 15 books in total

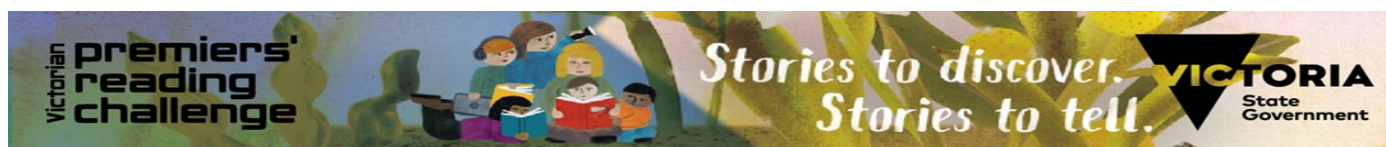

We have had another big week in Prep! Students have been enjoying exploring books on Epic during our Digital Technology lessons. Students have had the opportunity to read a book themselves or listen to one. During Integrated Learning, we have been discussing different emotions the bear from *The Very Cranky Bear* was feeling and why. Students loved getting to choose an emotion to add to their own cranky bear and we had some very creative drawings!

For Maths, we are continuing with our counting and place value unit, and the students were identifying 'one more' or 'one less' for numbers up to 20. It has been great to see the students use different hands-on materials to help with this such as tens-frames and counters.

YEAR ONE

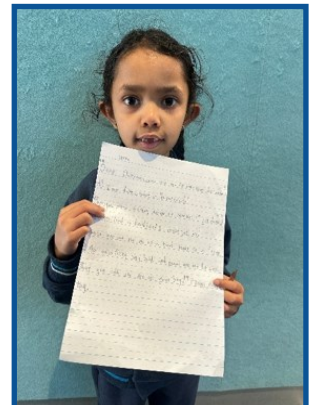
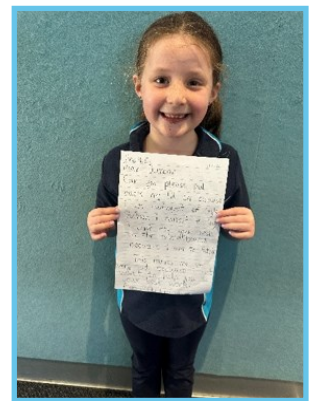
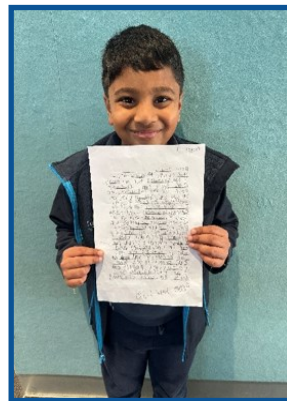
Year Ones have had another successful week as we near the end of the term.

This week in Phonics, we have been exploring words with 'oi' and 'oy' sounds and have practised reading and spelling a variety of words with these sounds.

In English, we have been focusing on the text *The Day the Crayons Quit*. In response to this text, we have been learning about the structure of persuasive letters and have written their own persuasive letter in response to the text. Students then presented these letters in front of their peers where they focused on posture, tone of voice and their ability to ask relevant questions and provide positive feedback to their peers. Students displayed fantastic listening skills while others were presenting.

We have finished our addition and subtraction unit in Maths, we are so proud of the students showing their ability to use number lines and tens-frames to consolidate their knowledge of these concepts.

With the Production quickly approaching, we have been learning the lyrics and choreography for our performance. Students have been working hard to remember the different dance moves and transitions throughout the songs, and we are so excited for all our families to see this at Production next term.

YEAR TWO

Yet another fantastic week here in Year Two! Week Eight included many hands-on learning activities that brought about so much fun!

In Mathematics, we finished exploring Mass with our scale, and moved towards Capacity. Students had the opportunity to explore with informal units like rice and blocks, to help us assess the capacity of some differing containers.

In Wellbeing, students worked on their teamwork, collaboration and communication, putting these skills to the test with fun challenges!

In English, we have been looking at a new text, *The Boy and The Elephant*, which has aided our exploration of persuasive features, such as rhetorical questions, emotive and inclusive language.

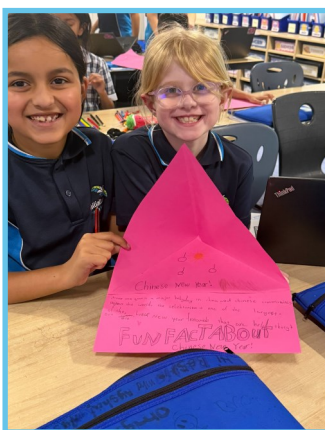
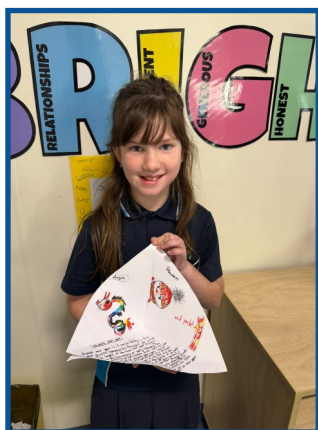

YEAR THREE

In Year Three Mathematics this term students have been developing their understanding of addition and subtraction through partitioning numbers and using vertical algorithms. They have also explored factors and learned how numbers can be divided into equal groups. Students have been building confidence in solving problems, explaining their mathematical thinking and applying efficient strategies to a range of mathematical tasks.

In Integrated Learning, students explored a range of world religions and developed an understanding of different beliefs, traditions and places of worship. As part of their learning, students researched their chosen religion and created a triorama to showcase their knowledge. This project encouraged creativity, inquiry skills, and an appreciation of the diverse cultures and faiths that make up our world.

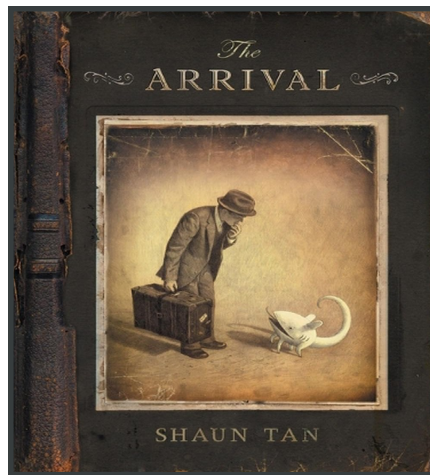

YEAR FOUR

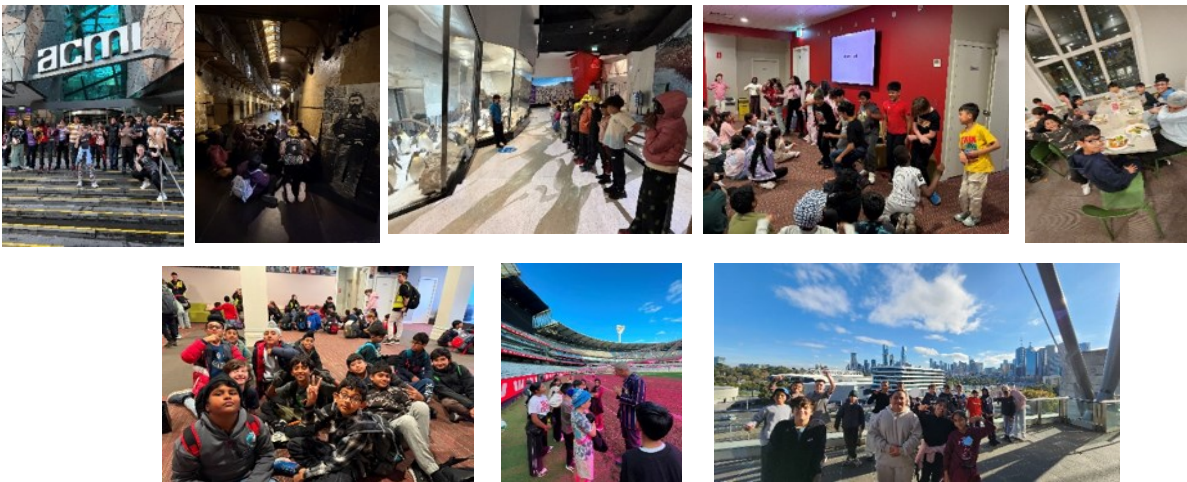

VISUAL ARTS

CENTRAL PLAZA BENCH PROJECT

On Monday our House Captains, Cultural Captains, Art Captains and Indigenous students worked with Indigenous artist Samantha Richards to create a design for one of the concrete benches in Central Plaza. Sam talked to the students about the meanings of the colours and designs in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags, the meaning behind the 14 symbols used by the Bunurong and Wurundjeri people and their seven seasons. Sam also shared with the students, a possum skin ball and possum and kangaroo skins and explained their cultural purpose. Sam will combine the students' ideas to create a design which will be painted onto the bench next Wednesday. Stay tuned for photos in the coming weeks.

MUSIC

Students across the school have been developing their musical skills through a range of engaging activities this week.

Prep students have been exploring how music can express emotions through listening, drawing, discussion and performance, using dynamics to communicate different feelings.

Year One students have been working collaboratively to create and perform short musical compositions using melody, rhythm and percussion instruments.

Year Two students are showcasing their creativity by creating their own favourite songs inspired by traditional and cultural music studied throughout the term.

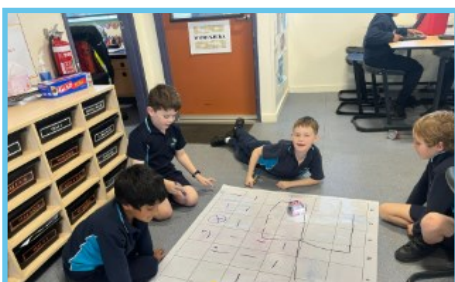
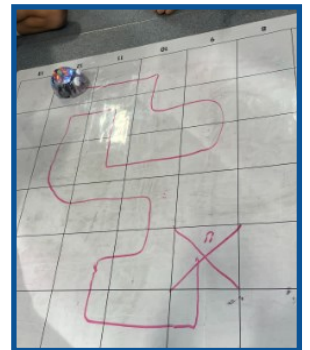
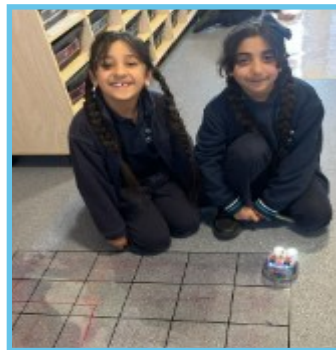
In Year Three, students have been practising and performing interlocking rhythm patterns with partners, while Year Four students are learning about different music genres and exploring how instruments and mood contribute to each style.

Students in Years Five and Six are expanding their keyboard skills by learning new chords and performing along to a variety of songs. Students interested in extending their musical learning have also had opportunities to explore ukulele improvisation and guitar playing, developing skills in creating solos and reading TAB notation to perform popular guitar riffs.



STEM

Our Year One and Two students have been exploring digital systems through hands on programming with Blue-Bots and the Bee-Bots. This week, they learned to navigate a clear path grid, identify how hardware and software work together and build confidence using basic algorithms to solve simple problems. Working in pairs, students showed wonderful teamwork as they shared resources, supported each other and patiently worked through challenges. It has been fantastic to see their problem solving skills grow as they experimented, tested ideas and refined their instructions using the Bee-Bot and Blue-Bot apps.



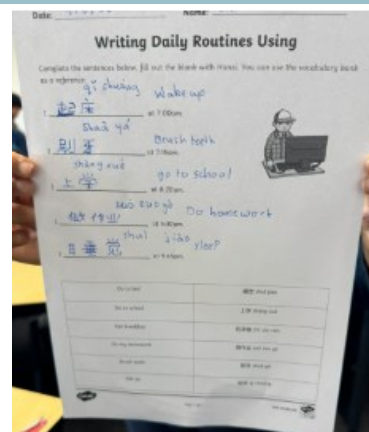
SPECIALISTS
