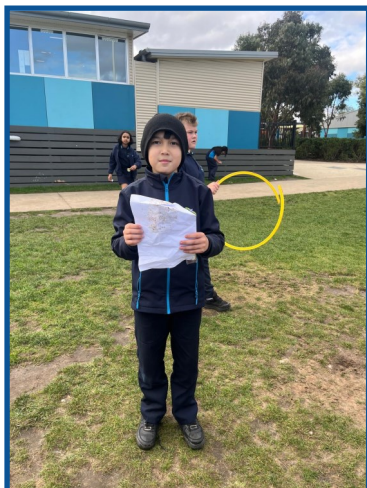

Year 3 - 6: Students are to read 15 books in total

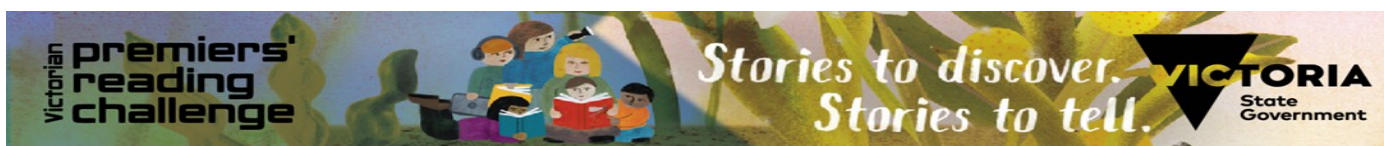

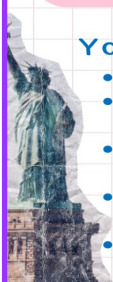

We hope that you all have a safe and relaxing break, and we will see you in Term Three!



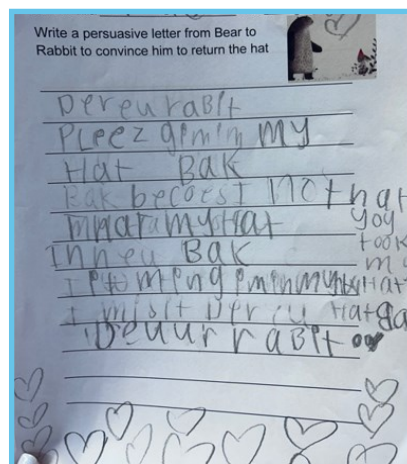
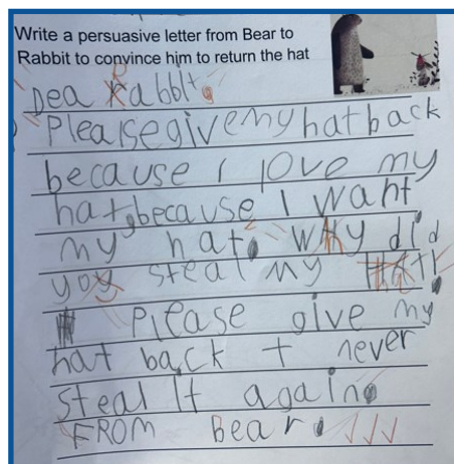
YEAR ONE

Year Ones have had another busy week. We concluded our Phonics unit in which we were exploring how to read and spell words with different digraphs, such as 'oi' and 'oy'. We also summarised how to read and spell words with suffixes 'ing', 'er', 'ed', 'es' and 'est'.

During English classes, students used their imagination and creativity to write a persuasive letter inspired from one of the two texts we have recently been studying: *I Want My Hat Back* and *The Day the Crayons Quit*.

During Mathematics, we have been discussing time by exploring days of the week, months of the year and by comparing familiar events to determine if they take a short time or a long time to complete. Students have also been working diligently to prepare for student led conferences by reviewing previous learning tasks and reflecting on their efforts across subject areas.

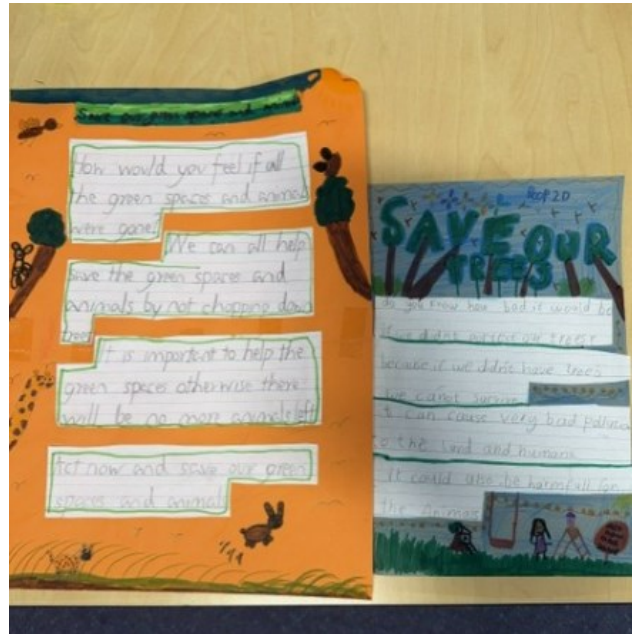
YEAR TWO

In Maths, we had some more hands on activities when we worked on capacity. We filled up containers to measure, estimate and compare how much the containers were able to hold.

In Integrated Learning, we have been creating our own newspaper articles about the special event that happened in the 1960s, when the city of Perth was viewed from Space. This was based on the text 'The City of Lights.'



We have also been busy preparing for the Student Led Conferences. It's been great to see the students reflecting on all their hard work throughout the year.

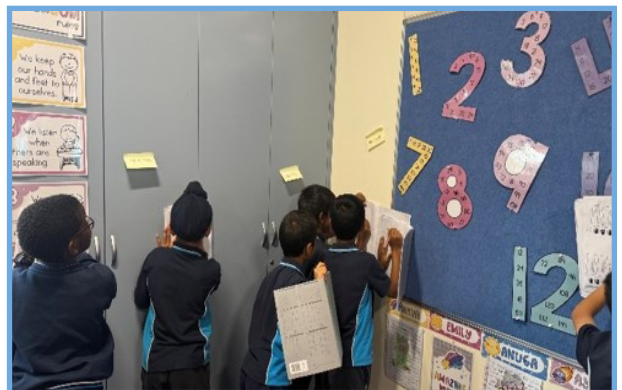
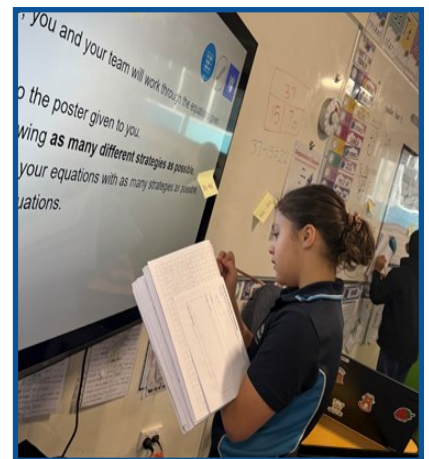
YEAR THREE

Well done to all our Year Threes for their hard work throughout the term! We wish you a safe and happy holidays, and see you all in Term Three!



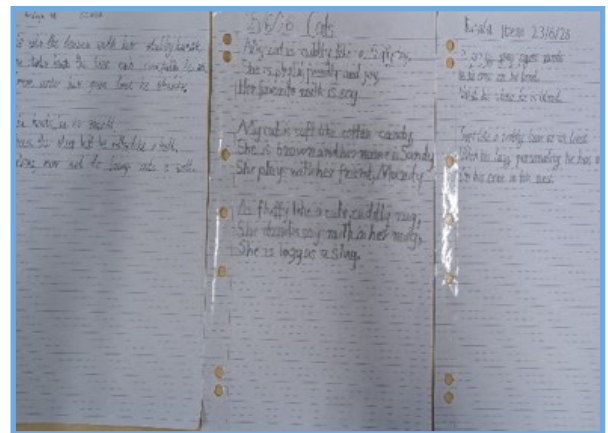
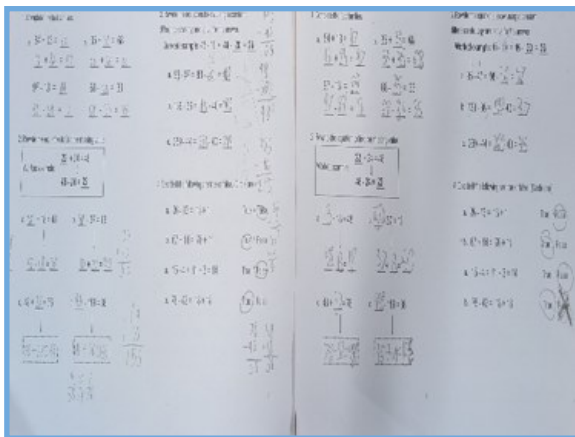

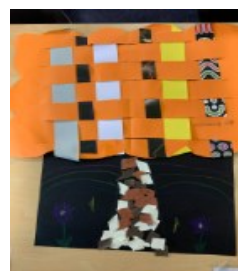
VISUAL ARTS

We wish you and your families a wonderful break. We can't wait to see what our Tulliallan students will create in our Art space in Term Three!

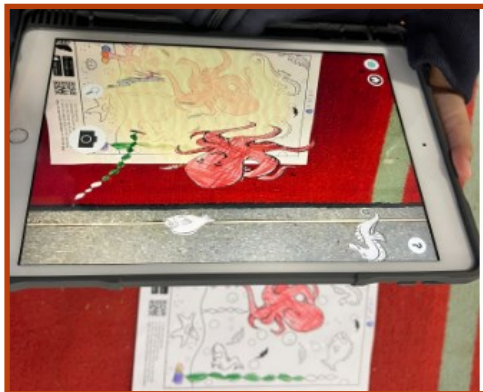
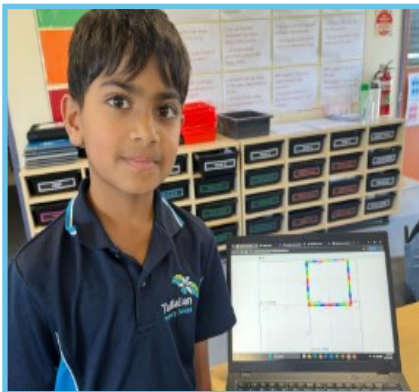


SPECIALISTS

MANDARIN

Last week in Mandarin, Tulliallan students celebrated their learning in Term Two.

Prep students revised numbers 1-10 before a speaking test on their knowledge of polite words and numbers.

We were pleasantly surprised to find out how much they have retained!

Years One and Two students revised vocabulary about six classroom items and six stationeries, as well as four colours. They showcased their process in a speaking assessment. Most of the students were able to recall at least 8 words out of 16, while some remembered all of them!

Years Three and Four students had a brief recap on the vocabulary about days of the week, time and daily routines, before taking a speaking test. They were very proud of their achievement!
