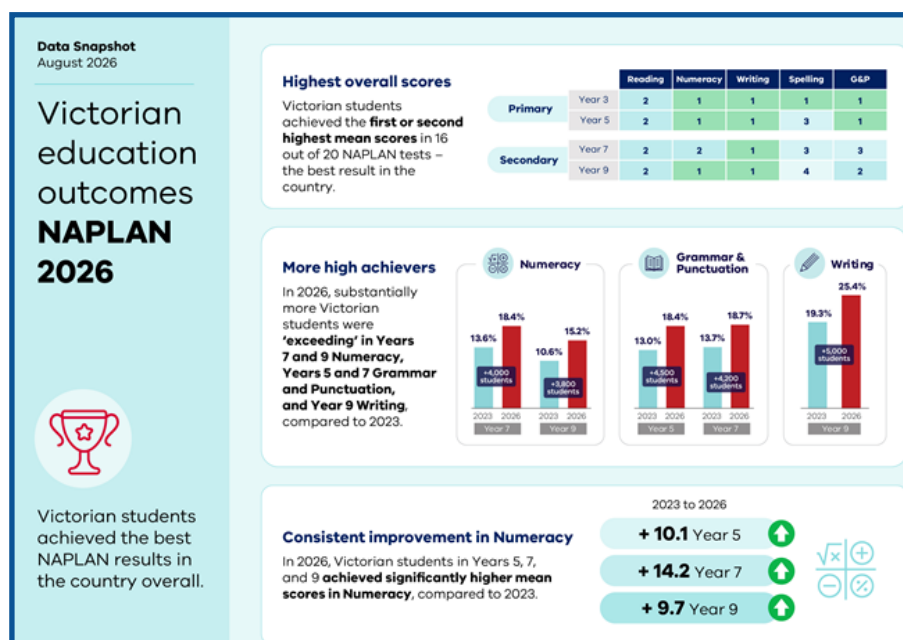


PRODUCTION BADGES ON SALE!

2027 PREP ENROLMENTS – ACCEPTANCE LETTERS

Under Department of Education Enrolment Policy, families needed to submit their enrolment forms by the 31st of July. Acceptance letters will be sent out by the 14th of August to all families whose enrolment meets the Department of Education's Policy. As we are under an Enrolment Management Plan, we accept enrolments for students who reside in our school zone or have a sibling that will be at TPS for 2027. We are expecting to have approximately over 120 Preps for 2026.

2027 PREDICTED ENROLMENTS

In 2027, we have calculated our predicted enrolments to be approximately 1210 students. We currently have 1330 students attending our school this year. If you are **not returning** to Tulliallan 2027, please advise the school office personnel as soon as possible so we can organise our Home Groups for 2027.

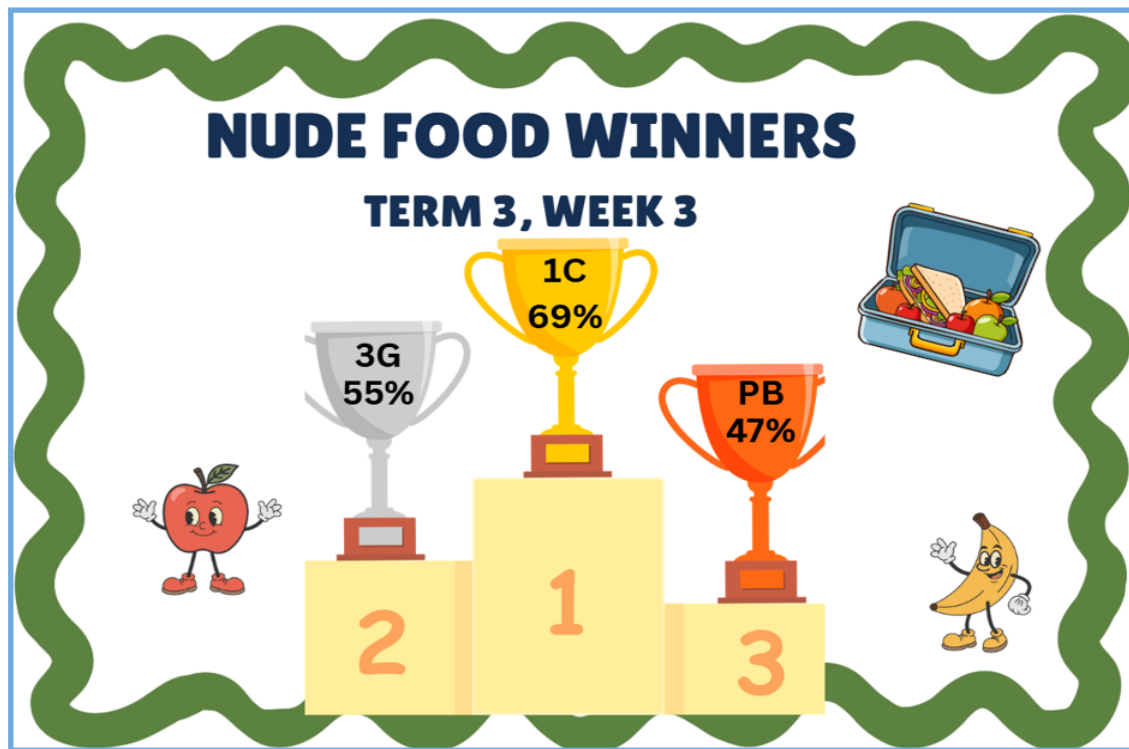
PJ Day 2026

BULLYING. NO WAY! SMALL ACTS, BIG IMPACT



Between the 17th – 21st August is National Action against bullying and violence. At Tulliallan Primary School we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

The theme for 2026 is “Small Acts, Big Impact”.

Putting a stop to Bullying is everyone’s responsibility and small acts make a real difference. Small actions like including someone, speaking up or showing kindness can create meaningful change. This year’s theme reminds us that actions don’t need to be big to change someone’s world.

In our school community our goal is to build environments where everyone belongs, diversity is celebrated and bullying is never accepted. During bully no way week, we encourage students, families and our community to engage in **small acts that can have a big impact against bullying.**

During this week Learning communities will make **“Small Acts, Big Impact”** a focus in their wellbeing lessons and throughout the week.

BULLYING. NO WAY!

If your child talks to you about bullying:

1. **Listen** calmly and get the full story.

5. **Contact** the school.
6. **Check in** regularly with your child.

Year Five and Six Treehouse Exhibition -Monday 3rd of August 2026-

Over Term Two and Term Three, the Year Five and Six students have planned, measured, built and evaluated their own cardboard treehouse.

Their brief was to create a freestanding treehouse made of and decorated with layers and textures of monochromatic cardboard and paper.

First they drew designs of treehouses in their sketch books, then they learnt about and practiced cardboard joining techniques (such as slots, tabs and flange).

All students will be receiving their Small Group Learning goal this week and it will be sent out to families on Compass. Keep up all the amazing work!



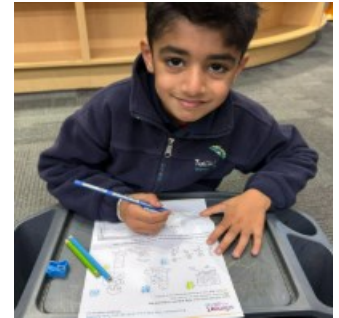
SCHOOL NEWS

PREP

It has been another busy and exciting week in Prep! The children participated in our Cyber Safety incursion, where they learnt about setting screen time routines using a timer and explored healthy activities they can do after using a device at home. They enjoyed sharing their ideas and practising how to make balanced choices around technology.



In Math's, we have been learning different strategies to solve subtraction problems. We have been using pictures, counting back and number tracks to help solve different subtraction problems.



During Text Study, we started a new book called *Farmer John's Truck*. Students practised retelling the story after changing one element, such as adding a new character or choosing a different setting. It was wonderful to see their creativity and confidence as they shared their new versions.

Production practise is now in full swing and the Preps are so excited. Their energy, smiles and enthusiasm during rehearsals have been wonderful to see.

YEAR ONE

We had another incredible week in Year One, where we were very excited to attend not one, but TWO incursions! Our first incursion was all about Cyber Safety, where we learnt about how to build a balanced day that includes some screen time, but also some off-line activities such as crafting or drawing! Then, we were lucky enough to go to our Habitat Helpers incursion to learn about how we can take care of our environment by responding to health messages. Our 'Earth Heros' explored how to take care of our oceans, forests and bushlands by thinking carefully about animals' habitats.



In Phonics, we have been focusing on the 'ore' (as in 'shore') and 'aw' (as in 'yawn') sounds in words, alongside working hard on our handwriting. In Writing, we have been exploring the text *Jetty Jumping* and about how to use the conjunction 'and' to combine two sentences or ideas together. It has been fantastic to see the progress in Writing and we are looking forward to seeing what more students can achieve this term.



In Mathematics, Year Ones have greatly enjoyed revising how to make patterns and challenging themselves by learning about more complex patterns. This will help students as we begin focusing on skip counting and recognising number patterns.

YEAR TWO

This week, Year Two students enjoyed participating in the eSmart Story Incursion, where they learned how to stay safe, respectful and responsible when using technology. Students also designed and painted their own T-shirts for our upcoming school production, showing wonderful creativity.



In Maths, students have been exploring sharing and grouping to develop their understanding of division and multiplication. In English, students have been planning and writing their own narratives. They have focused on creating interesting characters, developing a clear beginning, middle and end, and using descriptive language to make their stories engaging. We are so proud of all the hard work and enthusiasm Year Two have shown this week. Keep up the great work!

YEAR THREE

Year Three students have had another busy and engaging week of learning! In Literacy, we continued reading *The Iron Man*, developing our comprehension skills by discussing key events, answering questions and exploring how the author builds suspense throughout the story.

In Maths, students focused on recognising, comparing and drawing right angles.

During Inquiry, students designed a blueprint for a machine to help solve a problem, making sure to plan and label it.

In Production, students learnt the songs and dance routines for our upcoming performance, showing great enthusiasm and growing confidence. We are very proud of the effort and positive attitude our Year Three students have shown throughout the week.



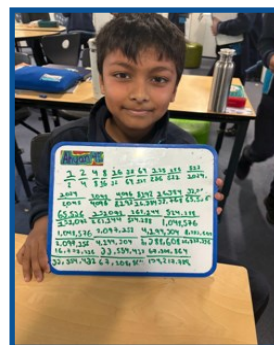

We are looking forward to another great week of learning!

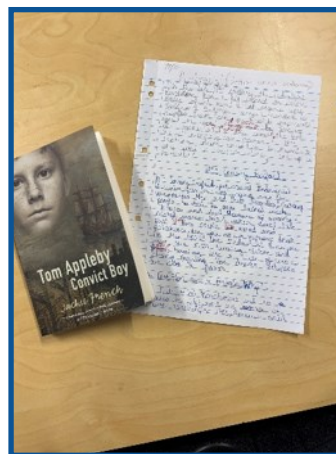
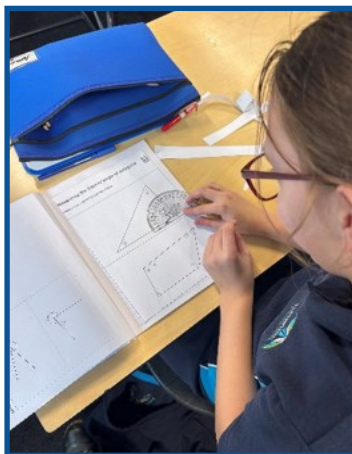


YEAR FIVE

VISUAL ARTS

It has been another exciting week in the Art space!!

Year Three and Four students have been busy creating the start of their echidna artworks. Students started with creating pattern paper using pastel and watercolour paints. They then moved onto using this pattern paper to create the echidna spines (quills) by measuring, cutting and gluing triangles to create the body of their animal. They are looking amazing so far and we can't wait to share with you all, the finished Art pieces in the upcoming weeks.

SPECIALISTS

MANDARIN

What a busy week in Mandarin! Prep students acquired vocabulary about body parts including head, shoulders, knees and toes. They enjoyed the classic song by the same name in Mandarin, moved their bodies and played the gesture game where they had to point at the body part mentioned by the teacher.

Years One and Two students consolidated their vocabulary about fruits through singing, dancing and games. They expressed their preferences using simple sentence patterns such as "I like to eat/I don't like to eat" + fruits. We were very proud to hear students gaining more confidence in recalling fruits and sentence patterns.

Years Three and Four students continued acquiring vocabulary for sports. On top of basketball, volleyball, badminton, ping pong, soccer and baseball, they also learnt cricket, tennis, running and swimming. Through gestures and movement, students were thoroughly engaged in the lessons.

Year Five and Six students continued exploring the topic of Chinese currency and exchange rates as part of the Earn and Learn unit. Students revised numbers 1-100, before acquiring 101-999 in order to help them convert between Australian dollars and Chinese Yuan.

The Language and Culture Club ran successfully, where students felt a sense of belonging playing Chinese games and singing karaoke in various languages.



MUSIC

Students have been thoroughly enjoying their time in Music this term.

Prep students explored the musical element of pitch (high and low) through movement, storytelling and instrumental sound effects. They were allowed to respond physically and musically to changes in pitch, while creating a space-themed soundscape.

Year One and Two students explored things that keep us healthy through dance, singing and movement. Students created a healthy and active routine which they performed for their peers.

Years Three and Four students practised and performed rhythm patterns to a beat. They also worked on tasks to help them understand how syncopation works in music.



Year Five and Six students continued experimenting on BandLab. So far, they have chosen their own instrument sounds to replace Midi files for drums, bass, pad and lead synth. This week they explored adding effects like reverb and distortion to enhance their remix of 'Birds of a Feather'.

Jump Rope for Heart Update

Our Tulliallan Primary School Heart Heroes are making an incredible impact through this year's **Jump Rope for Heart** program.

So far, we have:

- **31 students registered**
- **Raised an amazing \$1,559**
- **Logged 5 hours of skipping activity**

These are fantastic results, and we are incredibly proud of the enthusiasm and generosity our students and families have shown.

When students sign up for Jump Rope for Heart, they become **Heart Heroes!** Who doesn't want to be an everyday superhero helping to lead the fight against heart disease, while learning the importance of staying active and looking after their own health and wellbeing.

A huge thank you to all of our students, families and staff who have supported the program so far. Every registration, donation and minute spent skipping helps make a difference in supporting the lifesaving work of the Heart Foundation.

STEM

Last week in STEM, Prep and Year One students explored how forces affect movement through a variety of active and engaging challenges. Students investigated how pushes and pulls can change the way objects move as they kicked soccer balls into goals, bounced basketballs, moved on scooter boards using their hands, played noodle hockey and threw balls at targets. Through these hands-on activities, students learned how forces can make objects start moving, stop, change direction or move at different speeds.



Our Year Three and Four students focused on investigating friction and how it affects movement. Students designed and created ramps using different materials, including sandpaper, felt, bubble wrap, aluminium foil, and plain paper. They discussed how each surface might affect the movement of an object and shared their ideas before testing.



As young scientists, students developed a hypothesis, a clever guess based on what they already knew. They then conducted a fair test, ensuring they changed only one variable at a time while observing and recording the results. This helped them make accurate comparisons between the different ramp surfaces. Through their investigations, students discovered that some materials created more friction and slowed objects down, while others allowed objects to move more easily. It was wonderful to see students using scientific thinking, making predictions, testing their ideas and drawing conclusions from their observations.
